# THE 10th NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS A FORESHADOWING OF HEAVEN

Club members Larry Gillespie and Maureen Collins were blessed to be able to attend the 10th National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, IN held July 17-24, 2024. They will be discussing this event as our featured speakers at our August 27th meeting next month but they wanted to "whet your whistle" with a few highlights.

Larry's favorite memory was during the opening ceremony Wednesday night at Lucas Oil Stadium when Bishop Cozzens processed in carrying Our Lord in a monstrance while 45,000-55,000 Catholics prayed in adoration. This procession and adoration event was repeated every evening.

Larry and Bob Labat walked in the Eucharistic Procession from the Convention Center to the heart of downtown Indianapolis along with 20,000-50,000 other pilgrims. It looked like a modern-day scene plucked out of the New Testament.

St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church was located just across the street from the Eucharistic Congress. They were gracious enough to dedicate their entire sanctuary for 24-hour adoration. The church was packed every time we visited.

# THE HOLY SPIRIT CONTINUES TO CALL MEN TO THE PRIESTHOOD

The French Bishops' Conference recently announced that 105 young men will be ordained to the priesthood this year. That number is 17 more than in 2023. Of these new French priests, 73 are diocesan, and the rest to religious orders or priestly societies. Apparently there would have been more ordinations, but for a dispute between some French Bishops and the Vatican regarding the traditional Latin mass. If you know your history, you are aware that conflicts between the Bishops of France and the Papacy are not new.

Meanwhile in the U.S., the number of young men entering the priesthood and receiving the sacrament of Orders continues to increase each year. The always reliable website <u>Crux Now</u> reports that most of the young men ordained in 2024 are 31 years old or younger. That is a good sign.

The Georgetown Center for Applied Research recently reported a nationwide survey of priestly ordinations. A total of 392 ordinands responded to the survey: 80 percent were diocesan, 16 percent were from religious orders, and 17 percent were foreign-born.

When I was reading online articles about the new ordinations, I was struck by one particular name: John Andrades, a young man from Pakistan. He was raised in a Catholic family in a country that has only a tiny Catholic population. Fr. Andrades entered the seminary in Pakistan, but transferred to the Archdiocese of Baltimore before ordination. Meanwhile, lest you worry that Pakistan is impoverished due to its loss of Fr. Andrades, the O.M.I Fraternity in Pakistan recently announced the ordination of two new native Pakistani priests: Fr. Adil Shamaoun and Fr. Ikram Philpus.

What's going on here? Is the Catholic Church making a comeback?

It's a good question, because in recent decades the Catholic faith has suffered greatly from the twin malaises of indifference and secularization. That's why the French ordinations are good news: France is undoubtedly the most secular country in Europe.

Over the centuries, the Church has suffered wars, crucifixions. persecutions, assassinations, imprisonments, martyrdoms, heresies and slanders. The Church has survived, and thrived, because Christ gave us the Eucharist for our food. The brotherhood of St. Peter and his fellow apostles, and their successors, have carefully guarded and handed down this precious gift to us. So, let's be thankful that God has raised up these newly ordained young men, whether in France, the United States, or Pakistan, to serve God at his altar.

# WHAT IS A DEACON? Deacon Alexander R. Marguette

Deacon Alex Marquette is a transitional deacon for the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis. He was ordained on May 11, 2024. Deacon Alex comes from St. Timothy Parish in Maple Lake. He has wanted to be a priest from when he was in the third grade.

Deacon's childhood pastor was Bishop Izen (then Fr. Izen), who taught him to altar serve in the fourth grade. Deacon Alex graduated from St. John Vianney College Seminary in 2021 with degrees in Philosophy and Catholic Studies and a minor in Spanish. When he started at St. Paul Seminary in the fall of 2021, he was assigned Immaculate Conception in Columbia Heights to be his teaching parish. Deacon Alex will be serving at the Church of St. Odilia in Shoreview for the summer before beginning his last year of studies at the St. Paul Seminary this fall. He came to share with our Serra Club what it is to be a deacon.

Complete details about what a deacon is, what he does, and how he is different from a priest can be found in the <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church Online</u>, page 392-393, Articles 1569-1571.

Deacon Alex expressed to us that being ordained by and serving as deacon at the altar next to his childhood pastor, Bishop Izen was super special. He was able to preach at home on Mother's Day and Ascension Sunday. He loves to preach and to share what is on his heart. He loves blessing people, especially students. St. Timothy's, Rose, and Unity HS has been most fulfilling. He is looking forward to officiating his cousin Claudia's wedding. Serving at the altar in his home parish and at the Seminary is a privilege.

Maureen's favorite memory the was procession into the stadium for the final Mass on Sunday morning. At the head of the procession were 10 Knights of Columbus, 10 members of the Order of Malta, 10 Knights and Dames of the Holy Sepulcher, followed by approximately 250 seminarians, 1000 priests and deacons, 70-80 bishops and cardinals, and Our Lord Jesus Christ in a monstrance. It took minutes to prayerfully process Approximately 200-300 sisters served ushers. The ease with which they were able to distribute Holy Communion to 50,000-60,000 people was remarkable.

The procession made us think of attending a Mass in heaven. The following verse is out of context, but it certainly came to mind.

"An angel came and stood at the altar, having a golden censer; and there was given unto him much incense, that he should offer it with the prayers of all saints upon the golden altar which was before the throne."



### Simone – Immaculate Conception Catholic School Vocations Essay – Girl's First Place Award

Visiting the Little Sisters of the Poor helped me reflect on my vocation. In the future, I hope to become a mother. I have always liked to care for people, and seeing the sisters care for the elderly touched my heart. It helped me realize that I need to remember how little time we have on Earth and that with this time I need to love others while I have a chance. By living for God now, it will allow me to live with God in the future. I was inspired to see all of these women using their talent and love to care for people who need help.

Showing hospitality is something the sisters are known for. I can live for God by doing the same. I feel God is calling me to have children and bring more love into the world. I believe teaching my children how to show the same hospitality that the sisters have will better the world. I feel so blessed that I have the chance to experience this world, and if I can make it even a little bit better that would be fulfilling my vocation. In my life I will work hard to show hospitality because it makes a difference in every person that it affects.

I felt the Holy Spirit very strongly when we visited the Little Sisters of the Poor. It felt very peaceful. When we talked with the elderly, they seemed very happy and willing to share their experiences with us. I felt this kind of safety and warmth when we were there, it felt as if someone were giving me a hug. All of the Nuns were so empathetic and treated the elderly as if they were family. I believe that is how all people should be treated, but that is not always the case. It was very eye-opening to actually see people devoting their life to others.

In this time of my life, I think God is calling me to just stay faithful to Him and to never forget that I am His child. By remembering to treat others as I would treat Jesus I can be like the Little Sisters. Going to the Little Sisters helped me to refresh my mind and to think about all of the things that I can be doing so serve others and to serve the Lord. I am very grateful that I was able to have this experience.

### Lucas – Immaculate Conception Catholic School Vocations Essay – Boy's First Place Award

This month, I was given the honor of being able to travel to the St. Thomas University Seminary and explore the vocational journey of the seminarians. Throughout my experience I felt the spirit of the Lord within me and explored different opportunities of God's vocation for me. We started our trip at one of the newly built chapels in one of the two seminaries. We learned from a seminarian about the spiritual meaning of the chapel itself, that the strong supporting pillars of the chapel represent the pillars of the responsibilities that must be upheld by us young men going into adulthood, and that we must learn to be responsible human beings. We then got to hear the vocational journeys of three young seminarians just beginning their spiritual journey into eventual priesthood. Through their stories I learned about what a vocation truly is. It is not just something you want to specifically grow up to be and do in life, it is God's calling for you as you go out into the world. I even learned that for some people they don't even want to do what their vocation eventually will be when they are young. It is all about the time it takes for you to realize God's calling for you.

After that, we got to explore the St. Thomas campus and look at some of the beautiful new structures that have been built. We got to go into the daily life of the seminarians and what their schedule looks like at school. After that we went to the next seminary to eat lunch. During that time period we met with three more seminarians (one of whom was Alex Marauette, a seminarian trainee at my school and was only three weeks away from becoming ordained,) and we got to talk to with them about their vocational journey to priesthood. Every seminarian's story really influenced me in a way I never felt before. I always thought to become a priest you had to be perfect, but it turns out you don't. Some seminarians even said that earlier on in their life they weren't the best people or they didn't want to start out as a priest because they thought it was boring or a waste of a lifestyle, but that was only part of their journey. So, they continued on and learned that the

spiritual life was what was most important for them through spending more time and opening their hearts to God. I feel like that taught me that the more I can open my heart to God, the more I will hear Jesus speak through me and eventually reveal to me my one true vocation.

Lastly to end the day, we attended Mass in the chapel. To me this was the most influential part of the entire day as a whole. I have attended Mass for my entire life and Mass is always special to me. However, I felt something even more special when I attended Mass at the chapel. I noticed that when the seminarians were attending, they were so peaceful and so content in the Mass it was almost as if the Lord Himself was right in front of them at that moment, and they were worshipping at His feet.

The priest then came up after the Gospel to preach the homily. The priest was talking about the world itself and how everyone has different opinions in the world. Everyone has their different beliefs, religious or political, but all of that is just opinion to the one true fact which is God. Whenever I feel indifferent to someone else, I should listen to God, because God is the only one who says the full truth. He is the only one without sin. I believe that if we all came together as brothers and sisters and follow the word of God, we would all be one in the spirit. In going to Mass, I always forget my hardships in life. I forget my conflict with others. I go to Mass to pray to my Lord for just an hour a day, but that completely lifts my spirit, and I can feel a joy like no other. Getting to go to St. Thomas Seminary was such a spiritual joy for me, and a great lesson for how God can speak to you and you speak to Him. I may not know my vocation yet, but my heart is joyous knowing that my path with God is continuously moving up the hill of life. I know I am still far from the top but when I get there and God can reveal to me my one true vocation in life, I will know that the climb was worth every step of the way.


particular interest to North-Minneapolis Serrans and a marvelous follow up after meeting the artist, Nicholas Markell who spoke at our February Serra members meeting.

Father Kelly celebrated the Liturgy of the Mass on the Feast day of Saints Peter and Paul, (Saturday, June 29). Father Evan Koop concelebrated and Deacon Stephen Koop assisted on the Altar while our District Governor, Debbie Koop served as reader. Sharing the missionary zeal of St. Serra with the two apostles, certainly gave us a meditation on the universality of our Church. Father gave us a special blessing with the relic of St. Junipero Serra at the end of Mass.

During brunch, Father Kelly shared a few insights, commenting on the scope of the SJV college program. Because of the intensity of seminary studies, participation in sports is limited to intermural activities. While seminarians join St. Thomas students in the classroom and may attend some sports events, their day is focused on spiritual formation. A version of the propaedeutic year required by St. Paul Seminary (SPS) is now integrated within the four years at SJV.

As he completes his third year as Rector, Father Kelly shared a few interesting insights during brunch. With the new construction completed, SJV now has room for 115 seminarians and will be accepting about 42 new seminarians this fall  $\sim$  13 for our archdiocese. Also, good news: 13 of the 20 SJV graduates of this year, plan to attend SPS in the fall. Father spoke of the "last chance" nine o'clock Mass which is held in the beautiful chapel, and often attended by students at the University of St. Thomas  $\sim$  a real plus for sharing the campus.

Encouraging attendance at an Ordination, can be one of the best ways to inspire priestly and religious vocations according to Father Kelley, noting that the beauty of the Liturgy and the large presence of priests, deacons, and religious can motivate someone who may be hearing God's call.

This Spring as I was preparing the April and May Issues of our North-Minneapolis Serran Newsletter and, noting the priest's anniversaries, I came across a beautiful article and photo of now "Bishop-Elect" Kevin Kenney in the St. Olaf Church Magazine as he was celebrating his 30th Anniversary. At the time, I requested permission to reprint and never heard back. I was drawn to his tender regard for prayer to inspire and sustain vocations. Excerpts of his article follow.

"I remember almost forty years ago when I was on my "Spring Retreat" and stood before God and asked, "Lord, what do you want me to do with my life?"

I needed to trust and believe. I said, I'll do anything except work 24 hours a day/seven days a week, and I do not want to be a priest'.' I will be ordained thirty years at the end of May. I said, "I'll give it a try'.' I knew many people were praying for me even before that day and, after that time away, even more began to pray. Prayer lifts us up and even if we do not recognize that people are praying for us, we wonder at times where the spirit is coming from.

God continues to call young people to consider a vocation and we need to pray for their hearts and ears to be opened to listen. We will be blessed in May to welcome thirteen young men into the priesthood in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. We pray that their transition and love for Jesus will inspire them to serve those where they will be sent with hearts on fire for the love of Jesus and humankind.

"....let us continue to pray for one another and pray that vocations in the Church continue to increase for the priesthood, religious life of brothers and sisters, the deaconate, marriage, and a blessed single life.

He ended his article with our Archdiocesan Prayer for Vocations.

How beautiful to know that our new auxiliary-bishop has a heart for church vocations. We thank God for Bishop-

Elect Kenney and pray God's blessing upon him!

### CALL TO HOLINESS



Our call to holiness is renewed daily at the celebration of the Mass and reception of the Holy Eucharist. After 85 years, the Eucharistic Congress celebrated this summer in Indianapolis (the culmination of three years marking Eucharistic revival) is a powerful reminder of a love so great ~ the gift of Jesus Christ, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament.

Citing the 2020 PEW Research Study, which polled Catholics on their belief of the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist, almost 70 % polled said "NO!"

Fr. John Perricone, PhD. in an article published in *Crisis Magazine* provides an apt analysis explaining why Catholics have lost their sense of reverence for the Eucharist: Rooted in the era of the sixties, the Mass was called "a meal" and Holy Eucharist was referred to as a "bread of fellowship," theologically "traditional requirements for the reception of Holy Communion" which changed a sense of the sacred to that of a diminished or lesser understanding of the Eucharist.

To return to a correct recognition and understanding of the Eucharist, Father proposes: 1). Tabernacles be returned to the center of every church. 2). Abolish Communion in the hand. 3). Eliminate Extraordinary ministers of the Holy Eucharist and administer the Host on the tongue and 4). Reception of Holy Communion should always be kneeling.

As an extraordinary minister of Communion, I took umbrage of point number 3 until I read Father's explanation. I invite you to read his article and to understand as I have how through a gradual process, many have lost an appreciation of the incredible gift given to us in the True Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. The Sacred can never be seen as something common as we pursue holiness!



7/16/24

Meeting Opened with prayer led by President T. Regan at 8:55 am. The minutes from the previous meeting on 6/18/24 were approved.

**VOCATIONS:** MA Frank, M. Szydlik: Crucifixes in the Traveling Crucifix Program were retrieved, renewed, and returned to parishes. MA Frank received a note of appreciation from Alaska by someone who found a copy of Serra Favorite Prayers she and her husband had intentionally left in a northern MN church while on vacation to inspire anyone who came across it. The note contained a request for additional brochures along with a donation and well wishes for our apostolate. Others present recounted their habit of putting the brochure where it might be found by someone to treasure it and learn of Serra Club. **MA Frank** reminded us of our Memorial Book and the monthly sending of \$50 to Hope for Uganda for masses from the proceeds, followed by a discussion. The Seven Serrans for Vocation Directors in New Ulm and Helena Diocese were updated. Ground level, easily accessible storage space for Serra has been identified in St. Charles Parish Center. **M. Szydlik** mentioned the need to clarify the giving of spiritual bouquets for upcoming Priesthood Sunday this fall, as differentiated from mass offerings.
