"To affirm and promote vocations," the substance of the Serra mission.

by MaryAnne Frank In a very real way, we were asked to enact our mission by praying in the Adoration Chapel for the National Conference of Diocesan Vocation Directors (NCDVD). Our local apostolate along with other Serrans have responded generously by signing up in 2 – 3 hour stretches of prayer while the Vocation Directors participate in the ongoing conference, learning best practices to encourage religious vocations within their dioceses.

Roscella Connelly and I arrived at the Hilton Hotel Ballroom at 7:20 am for the first Monday "shift" of Adoration. We quietly positioned ourselves in the back of the Ballroom turned Chapel, noting that a number of priests were seriously at prayer. A Sanctuary with Altar, Tabernacle and Monstrance were the center of attention and adorned by colorful bouquets of flowers. We joined in chanted Morning Prayer as more priests joined to begin their day. Fr. Augustine from Indianapolis gave a brief introduction, describing blessings of the Chapel and each floor of the Hotel the previous night. Citing the restful beauty of flowers and plants at the Hotel entrance, he shared that he would have enjoyed staying in the moment; then he also reminded his brother priests that the world has built in distractions to draw us off course. He spoke of the risk of the devil to work on our sense of inadequacy to do God's work, our envy of gifts that others have been given

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Holiness: Withdrawal or Engagement

When Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger was elected pope, and took the name Benedict XVI, the secular media were mystified. Benedict?, they asked... Why this archaic name? Why not John, Paul, or John Paul? The media didn't quite understand that in choosing this name, Pope Benedict was sending us a message about Europe. For those who know their history, St. Benedict of Nursia, the founder of western monasticism, was also the father of "Europe" as we know it today. In St. Benedict's day, Europe was just emerging from the chaos

of the Barbarian invasions. The European world was in a state of war, ignorance, and poverty. Roman civilization and culture had become a distant memory.

St. Benedict founded his monastery in southern Italy, but his "Rule for Monasteries" inspired a movement that spread through every land north of the Alps and west of the Pyrenees. Benedictine monks educated both the sons of the nobility and the children of peasants. They taught the people the basics of classical education, theology and philosophy, as well as practical sciences: animal husbandry and crop rotation. The new learning helped to create the great medieval universities of Paris, Bologna and Oxford. The hard work of the monks fostered a new European civilization. Benedictines were not just monks; they were missionaries.

What's my point? you may well ask!

Just this: a Christian's commitment to "withdraw from the world" does not necessarily require total disengagement. The genius of Catholicism is that it encourages a rich variety of religious expression and practices, in all vocations and walks of life.

Which brings me to the subject of our friends in Russia: the Sisters in Jesus the Lord. These young women have given up marriage, promising careers, and comfortable surroundings in their homeland, to live in a dangerous country. Their objective is to help young women who suffer from the evil effects of a rampant abortion, and to lift people out of the deadening holdovers of communism. They minister by teaching, catechesis, music, and, most importantly, by their community prayer life.

Speaking of holiness – here's a chance for Serrans to withdraw from the world (briefly), in order to engage it more effectively: our upcoming Serra Retreat at King's House in Buffalo. Our retreat leader will be Deacon Joe Michalak, a brilliant and insightful man. The retreat will be held on the weekend of November 22-24, following our yearly Regional Conference and meeting. 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SPEAKER HIGHLIGHTS

Dianne Marie Johnson RN, MA, OCN, received her nursing license in 1972 and recently retired after 44 years of bedside nursing. She graduated from St. Mary's College (now St. Catherine's) and in 1998 received her B.A. with double majors in Philosophy and Catholic Studies. In 2006, she received a M.A. in Catholic Studies with emphasis in biomedical ethics from the University of St. Thomas in St Paul.

In 2001, Dianne founded Curatio. Aided by a few priests in the Archdiocese and St. Thomas professors, in part to answer her own longing for integrity between her faith and her work, and in part, to answer Pope John Paul II's call for re-evangelization of the modern world, Curatio functioned to recover the sacred, sacramental vision of the human person in health care.

Curatio's mission is to strengthen the faith of all Catholic Healthcare Professionals so that, animated from the Heart of Christ and growing in holiness, we are equipped to reclaim our sacred vocation of caring, witnessing with zeal to the Gospel of Life. (Curatio means healing in Latin. Curatio ex-corde Christi, Healing from the Heart of Christ). Dianne wanted not only to illustrate the importance of the Curatio Apostolate but also show how intimately the apostolate is connected to Jesus through prayer and the sacraments. She also knew that it would only bear fruit to the extent that time was spent with Jesus; just to be with Him.

But first, some background. The modern profession of health care in any meaningful sense was invented by the Church. Not only were its first practitioners members of religious societies, but the whole set of animating principles and ethical rules that framed it were all based on a thoroughly Christian worldview. That day is gone. The original drivers of health care have been usurped by a utilitarian worldview, which is about 1.) The elimination of pain, rather than the restoration of health, and compassion (suffering with) when health cannot be restored; 2.) Customers who demand that they receive what they want (pleasure and the absence of pain) rather than patients who seek to be restored to their proper functioning; 3.) The replacement of the medical professional with the medical practitioner whose concern is to give the customers what they want; 4.) A view of that customer as a collection of replaceable parts that can be changed to match the customer's desires, rather than as an integral

whole with a discoverable nature that is the basis of saying what counts as health.

Catholic medical professionals are working in a hostile environment, oftentimes even in the purportedly Catholic hospital. Curatio apostolate is attempting to strengthen those medical professionals to be what they are called by God to be, and perhaps one day to restore medicine to its Christian roots.

Secondly, Dianne shared an excerpt from "The Gift of Faith" by Father Tadeusz Dajczer. It examines knowing the importance and difference between rich and humble means within the Church. The French philosopher, Jacques Maritain, studied these means and divides temporal means that may be used for spiritual ends into two categories: rich temporal means and humble temporal means. Rich means are visible, tangible things like organizations, meetings, marches, church architecture

and the perhaps misplaced sense that "we've got it!" ~ all means of paralyzing our efforts to serve well. (I could easily apply his words to our work as Serrans)!

During our Chapel stay, Roscella and I had rich opportunity to pray for the success of this Conference. I began decades of the Rosary (a Hail Mary at each chair) for the priest who would be seated there, asking Our Blessed Mother to cover each priest with her mantle of love. With more chairs than Hail Mary's proffered, I asked Ann Radtke, NW Hennepin Serrans, who arrived with a friend, and Bob Labat to take over a shift of prayer, to continue praying over the remaining chairs.

Before leaving, Roscella and I met Cathy Ahern, Serra North Central Regional Director, Candice Tyrrell, USC Membership VP, and Dr. Anne Roat, Serra USC President.

and decoration, audio visual and mass media. A characteristic trait of rich means is their influence on one's self-love because their effects and results are apparent. There is danger in claiming these results as our own and as a result, adopting an attitude of triumph. The second type of means is humble means. In humble means, a true paradox of the dynamism of faith can be observed: the poorer they are—that is, the more destitute, the more insignificant in themselves, and the less visible---the more efficacious they are. Humble means is not dependent on tangible success.

In our lives and in the Church, we are used to relying on "rich means". We so very much desire to see the victory and triumph of Christ and to see His might and authority. Meanwhile, He is hidden; He is poor in Bethlehem, even poorer on Mount Calvary and maybe He is poorest of all in the Eucharist.

Thirdly, knowing the significance of humility and gratitude to God so He can heal us. In Dianne's last 15 or so years in radiation oncology, she was often present when the physician told the patient they had a terminal disease. She usually expected immediate tears under the immense weight of hearing this. But more often than tears, there would be a numbing unspeakable silence in the face of powerlessness and helplessness.

She personally finds the same kind of unspeakable silence at times after Holy Communion, and at other times when deep down she recognizes she can do nothing to save herself or her situation and, although she often thinks she can, it truly depends on the grace of God and when she realizes that--- she has no words to express such profound gratitude. It's in that moment when we can all realize the infinite love God has for us, and how God humbles Himself, became dependent and helpless as a child. To understand this humility, God will often bring us to a point where we are totally helpless and it's then He is showing us, helping us to really have faith in Him and not in us. We must die to ourselves like a grain of wheat and only if we die will we produce much fruit.

This past Friday, my school went to visit a convent. We met the Little Sisters of the Poor. While we were there, I learned a few things that the sisters do while taking care of the elderly. When they are dying, the sisters sit with them so they don't die alone. Or sometimes they will wait for their families to be in the room. The sisters serve the elderly day and night, hoping to meet their needs and to make them happy. They have lots of residences all around the world, so the sisters can help the elderly wherever they can. The order was founded by Jeanne Jugan in 1847, later on the congregation started spreading all over France and then took over in England in 1851, then Belgium, Spain, Ireland, and North Africa. In 1868 the first sisters came to America where thirteen homes were made in the United States in the first four years.

Some things I found interesting about one sister's story, was how she was called to become a sister when she was in 5th grade, and when she was in high school she met a guy and they dated for a while, even almost got married, but they didn't because she knew God was calling her to become a sister. She ended up telling her boyfriend and they broke up. He wished her the best on becoming a sister. Years later some of the sisters from the convent went to California. The sisters were at a church and started talking with a priest. He asked the sisters about her after 50 years and he became a priest.

This story she told us about, I really liked because I thought it was cute how he asked about her after 50 years and still remembered her. Even though they almost got married he never forgot about her and supported her on becoming a sister, even wishing her the best on becoming a sister.

The Vocations Field Trip was an informative trip where the students of St. John Paul II, Sacred Heart, and Immaculate Conception got to learn about the religious life and what it takes to make a religious vocation. Our trip consisted of a visit to the St. John Vianney Seminary, followed by a tour of the University of St. Thomas, later followed by a visit to the St. Paul Seminary where we ate and had mass. My favorite part was the Mass that we attended at the St. Paul Seminary. We also heard stories from seminarians and how God called them to religious life and many of us found those stories interesting and inspiring. I learned many things, including the fact that the seminarians study and live at the seminary. I found this really interesting because the seminary practically serves as their home and serves as a place where they spend most of their time. I also learned that it can take anywhere from five to eight years to become either a deacon or a priest, which surprised me.

This made me realize that seminarians are like brothers who work towards their goals together. I found this beautiful as it demonstrates that God can not only bring us closer to Him, but He can also bring humanity closer as well. Before this trip, the thought of spending years on years with others didn't really seem like something I would gladly do, or pick as my first choice, but this trip made me realize that the bond between humans is a special bond and serves as an example of God's work in people. God calls us to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Matthew 22:39) and by spending time with one another and growing together, we can accomplish this commandment instructed by God. To me, theseminary serves as a way in which the instruction given to us by God in Matthew 22:39 is fulfilled. By being in bonds of brotherhood, the seminarians set a great example of how we should act towards God's call.

Another thing that stuck out to me was the amount of time the seminarians spend studying. As stated before, seminarians spend anywhere from five to eight years working towards their goal of becoming priests or deacons. When I first heard this, I was surprised because five to eight years seemed like a long time, and although it may be a long time, I also learned that the seminarians love God above everything and that they are willing to do anything in order to serve Him. I found this incredible because it serves as a reminder that seminarians are people, just like us, and that if seminarians can achieve this tremendous amount of love for God, then we can too.

When I first put things into perspective, I thought that the seminarians had just spent the best years of their life towards restless studying, but they set a great reminder that God should always be our number one, that He should always be in our hearts and that He should always be deserving of our praise no matter the circumstance, difficulty, or time. After this, I realized the God had spoken to me through the reminder that the seminarians gave. I realized that God was asking me to be patient with Him, to give my time to Him, to love Him now, to desire Him now, and to devote my best self to Him. In conclusion, the trip taught me many things that have transformed my thoughts and ambitions and has allowed me to gain a newfound interest in the Catholic Faith. God also spoke to me during this trip, instructing me to seek Him now and for a long time, just like the seminarians. This trip will always be in my memory and will always serve as a reminder of what God wants me to do.

Meeting Opened with prayer by President T. Regan at 8:50 am. Minutes from 7/16/24 were approved.

Communications: J. Makowske and N. Swanson: J. Makowske thanked those who have signed up for a Eucharistic Adoration time at the downtown Minneapolis Hilton for the NCDVD Conference, Aug 24-29. There are displays from vendors for the various National Vocation Directors and an opportunity to meet and converse with them. If National Directors from New Ulm, MN or Helena, MT are encountered, they'll be pleased to meet members from our club who are praying for them as they do not have local Serra Clubs to support them.

Vocations: MA Frank, M. Szydlik: MA Frank reported gearing up in anticipation for Priesthood Sunday. A number of thank you notes have been received from different groups ranging from grade school, high school, college age and families who are enjoying God's creation at retreats and summer camps while nurturing their souls. They're very appreciative of our prayers. M. Szydlik reported working on the traveling classroom chalices to get them returned to the schools with updated information.
