PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



SET OUT ON THIS ADVENTURE WITH HIM

Dear Serrans:

It's almost harvest time. Did you put up jam this year, strawberry or raspberry? In my case it was kosher half-dill pickles, like I usually do, although "putting up" isn't quite right – they go in the refrigerator, not the pantry. They are very garlicky and delicious, and if you would like the recipe, no problem.

I was thinking about the harvest when I read Pope Leo's homily to the young pilgrims at the recent "Youth Jubilee" in Rome. The reports said there were over one million young people (!! Did I read that right?!)... camped in a field southeast of Rome. The organizers flew the pope in by helicopter to say Mass.

It was the weekend of the Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Recall the Gospel reading for that day, about the rich farmer who built new barns for himself, and filled them with the produce of the land, until they groaned with abundance. But then God said, "You fool, your life will be required of you this day!"

Interestingly, Pope Leo's homily focused not on this famous Gospel passage but on the Psalm reading for the day, the one about the grass which ". . . in the morning flourishes and is renewed, and in the evening fades and withers." The thousands of pilgrims camping in the field are like the grass: young, delicate, renewing the earth. He said, "We are not made for a life where everything is taken for granted and static, but for an existence that is constantly renewed through the gift of self in love."

Then Pope Leo, a true Augustinian, gave the kids a real zinger. He quoted from his patron St. Augustine who, reflecting on his own search for God, asked himself, "What then, is the object of our hope? Is it the earth? No. Is it something that comes from the earth, like gold, silver, or crops? No. . . . You, Lord, were within me. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance; I drew in breath, and I tasted you. I burn for your peace."

So, Pope Leo said to the young people, "Aspire to great things. Aspire to holiness, like young Carlo Acutis, who soon will be declared a Saint. Do not settle for less!"

"It is very beautiful," Pope Leo said, "especially at your young age, to open wide your hearts and let the Lord enter, and set out on this adventure with Him toward eternity."

SPEAKER HIGHLIGHTS

GET INVOLVED: WHY IT MATTERS TO VOCATIONS Debbie Koop June 10, 2025

Debbie Koop, District Governor for Serra District 7, joined our Serra Club to share why getting involved matters to vocations. Below are some statistics that make it clear.

In 1965, there were an estimated 60,000 Catholic priests serving a Catholic population of 45.6 million Catholics. By 2022, 57 years later, the number of priests had dropped 40% to around 35,000 serving a Catholic population of roughly 72 million, an increase of 56%.

Check out these numbers:

- In 1950, there was 1 priest to 652 Catholics in the United States.
- In 2010, (60 years later) there was 1 priest to every 1,653 Catholics in the USA.
- In 2016, there was 1 priest to every 1,843 Catholics in the United States. A numeric study shows that the tipping point in the USA happened around the year 1983. This is when our priest/Catholic ratio began to tank.

Some big cities are even worse. Here are the stats:

- Diocese of Dallas: 1 priest to every 6,229 Catholics.
- Diocese of Los Angeles: 1 priest to almost 4,000 (3,931) Catholics.
- Diocese of New York: 1 priest to over 2,000 (2,055)
 Catholics.

Debbie shared 5 things that the USCCB says will promote vocations. This is for all Catholics.

They are:

- Pray for an increase in vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. An increase in vocations will only happen with a strong foundation of prayer. If we want more priests, sisters, and brothers, we all need to beg!
- **Teach** young people how to pray. Pope Benedict XVI said that unless we teach our youth how to pray, they will never hear God calling them into a deeper relationship with Him and into the discipleship of the Church. Support your youth minister. Ask how you can help. Support families in educating their children. Give them vocations material found on the Serra SPARK website.
- Invite active young adults and teens to consider a vocation to the priesthood or consecrated life. A simple, sincere comment encouraging a young person to consider the priesthood, should not be

underestimated. The "Called by developed Name" program promoted by Serra and International, is recommended by the U.S. Bishops' Committee for Vocations. This successful program invites men women, 18 years of age or older, to consider a vocation as a priest, sister, or brother by asking parishioners to suggest



names of those who would be good candidates and following up with them. Archbishop Hebda is considering this and will be consulting with Father Pavlak, the Vocations Director. If we go forward with this, we will need all Serrans to help with this effort if it is to be successful.

- Make it attractive. Show the priesthood for what it truly is – a call to be a spiritual father to the whole family of faith. Similarly, the consecrated life for a young woman is a call to be united to Christ in a unique way, and to be a spiritual mother to those she encounters in her life and service. The challenge for priests and religious is to be joyful models of their vocations. Debbie's granddaughter, Clara, who is entering the Handmaids of the Heart of Jesus this August, said when she understood that she was called to spiritual motherhood, the Lord said to her, "You may not have any children that look like you, but they will look like me." Invite priests and religious to family gatherings. Clara grew up with the Handmaids coming to family dinners.
- Share your passion! Vocations must be talked about regularly if a "vocation culture" is to take root in parishes and homes. This means, first and foremost, the people need to hear about vocations from priests through homilies, prayers of the and discussions in the classroom. Vocations kept out of sight are out of mind. Give material from Serra to your pastor about vocations celebrations such as World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Religious Vocations, Life, Priesthood Sunday. Write articles for the bulletin and forward information for the Newman Connection to your youth leader to distribute to seniors graduating.

Our responsibility as Serrans is to be the face of Serra in our own parishes.

SPEAKER HIGHLIGHTS

JOHN IRELAND (1838-1918)

John Ireland was born in 1838 in County Kilkenny, Ireland, the second of seven children. His father was a wood worker. The family emigrated to the United States when young John was 10 years old, eventually settling in St. Paul, Minnesota.

In his teens he, along with a friend named Thomas O'Gorman, were invited to live in the local rectory. He later attended Seminaire de Meximiex in Province of Argonne - Alpes, France. On December 22, 1862, Fathers Ireland and O'Gorman were ordained in St. Paul by Bishop Thomas Grace. They were our first homegrown Minnesota priests.

Newly ordained Fr. Ireland volunteered for service as chaplain in the Civil War. He was assigned to the Fifth Minnesota Volunteers. In 1864, during the Civil War, Ireland found that he had enough, got bored, and was sent back to Saint Paul.

On December 21, 1875, John Ireland was ordained auxiliary bishop of St. Paul. Then in 1888, John Ireland became the first Roman Catholic Archbishop of Saint Paul when the diocese was raised to a metropolitan see. Ireland founded the College of St. Thomas and St. Thomas Academy.



In 1904 Ireland lured the world's greatest liturgical architect, Emmanuel Masqueray, from France to frigid Minnesota to come and design the new Cathedral of Saint Paul. Masqueray would go on to design not only the Cathedral of Saint Paul but also the Basilica of Saint Mary in Minneapolis, among other structures in the region.

Ireland was called the "Consecrated Blizzard of the Northwest" because of his fiery commitment to his views and his strong personality. He was profoundly committed to seeing Catholics become full partners in the building up of the American nation.

The Faribault-Stillwater Plan was also spearheaded by Ireland. It was a school arrangement in the early 1890's where Catholic parish schools were leased to the local public school districts for use as public schools. The plan emerged from a desire to find a solution to the ongoing tension between Catholic and public school systems regarding education.

The Phantom heresy of "Americanism" was also a term used in the late 1800's referring to a set of perceived errors within the Catholic Church in the United States. The controversy largely stemmed from a misunderstanding or misrepresentation of American Catholic thought by European observers. Archbishop Ireland was in the thick of it and perceived to be dangerous.

John Ireland loved his native country and the Irish. Below is a speech he gave on Saint Patrick's Day and some of his thoughts on Church/State and race relations.

Saint Patrick's Day speech:

Dear Ireland, you have never for a moment deviated from your allegiance; your faith is pure, unspotted, virginal – and an indictment of British malevolence.....

It is not thy fault that thy children are compelled to flee to foreign shores. The hills and the plains teem with plenteousness, but the oppressor is ever grawing at thy substance and consuming thy life!

.....But

There is one fault – I am not comparing us with other nations – it exists with us. It has done fearful harm. Intemperance. The foe to our race today (as the British were in olden times) is the saloon keeper. There are hundreds of saloons in our city. The remedy is....

Total abstinence!

This is what Ireland really thought about Church-State relations:

I love the Catholic Church and the American republic too deeply not to be ever ready to labor that the relations of the one with the other not be misunderstood...

- The Catholic Church, guarantor of divine revelation, refuted in her teachings the absurdities of Protestantism...
- The Church alone effectively guards against the forgetfulness of society for its origins, which leaves no space for defense against despotism!

A prophet on Summit Avenue (John Ireland on race relations)

There is but one solution to the problem, and it is to obliterate all color line...

In many states the law forbids marriage between black and white – in this manner fomenting immorality....

Let the Negro be our equal in the enjoyment of all political rights of the citizen. The Constitution grants him those rights; let us be loyal to the constitution.

***John Ireland, a man for his time, and ours.

Over the years, the Foundation has given a substantial amount of money to the North American College in Rome where our Archdiocese sends seminarians to study. The Foundation has also assisted the Sisters in Jesus the Lord serving in Vladivostok, Russia - a particularly challenging mission, requiring the sisters to learn and speak the language. Each year, The Serran Magazine lists the recipients so that we see how the money is spent to support programs worldwide. Internationally, the Serra Foundation supports seminaries, religious orders, diocese, houses of religious formation and vocations programs, and more throughout the world. This ensures that future generations will be able to receive the sacraments and understand what it means to be authentically Catholic. Last year, over 15 grants were awarded across the world.

How faithful are we to our "Fiat?" Created and called, each by name to serve our Heavenly Father, we need to constantly evaluate our vocational response to the Catechism's question, "Why did God make you?" As a child, I could easily rattle off, "God made me to know, love, and serve Him in this world and the next!" Those were the words pleasing to my teacher, but the substance of those words, I found as I grew, involved so much more. How could I know One Who I couldn't see? How could I love One or serve One that I didn't know? A conundrum for sure!

Gradually, through the careful teaching and example of parents and Godparents, teachers and friends, I learned to know God through His works, through the beauty of creation, through the kindness of those around me, through the vulnerable who who needed my care, through the unbidden love of others . . .



Vocation Bus Trips – M. Eastham: An e-letter was received by **M. Eastham** and **J. McGuire** from **Fr. Mark Pavlak**, Archdiocesan Director of Vocations, regarding behavior of 8th grade boys during visits to St. Paul Seminary. The letter contained instructions concerning the need for a ratio of 5 boys to 1 male chaperone, accompanied also by pastor or associate pastor, all from the same school. Students should be prepared in advance with questions. Bus trips should be only one school at a time. The Board discussed each of these requirements, determining those which could be accomplished with compromise, those which were not affordable, those which could not meet school afternoon bus schedules and possibilities that would rearrange the schedule. Points considered by the Board were: Are the boys too young for SPS; Should schools be responsible for transportation; Should visits be shorter, with students back at school in time for lunch; How important is Mass as part of the visit; Can the "trips" be moved to the schools? A meeting will be scheduled between **M. Eastham, J. McGuire** and **Fr. M. Pavlak**. Many church vocations have come about in the Archdiocese sparked by a "bus trip" to the Seminaries and Convents.

Membership – M. Collins and J. Collodora: Since the pastor of one of the parishes in North-Minneapolis that our Membership Team approached has not responded, **MA Frank** agreed with **J. Collodora** that both Epiphany Catholic Church in Coon Rapids and St. Stephen's Catholic Church in Anoka would be good choices to proceed with their plan.
