

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



THE SCARLET AND THE BLACK

Would you like to hear a story of danger, courage, hope and salvation?

October 30th is the feast day of Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty, the man who saved the lives of thousands of Jews and war refugees in Rome during World War II. Maybe you know it: the monsignor was played by Gregory Peck in the movie "The Scarlet and the Black."

Before the War, Hugh O'Flaherty was an Irish seminarian studying in Rome. He found that he

had a facility for learning languages. After his ordination, he was asked to stay on for work in the Vatican. During the German occupation of Italy, Fr. Flaherty organized networks of volunteer priests, nuns, and laypeople for saving Jews and war refugees from the clutches of the Nazis. Operating under the noses of the Gestapo, Fr. Flaherty and his secret group operated an ingenious and effective system of safe houses throughout Italy and the city of Rome. Fr. Flaherty unofficially became known as "The Scarlet Pimpernel of the Vatican."

Colonel Kappler, head of the Gestapo in Rome, was the monsignor's nemesis. He painted a white line on the bricks at the entrance of the Vatican, vowing that he would hang Fr. Flaherty if he got his hands him. After the war, Monsignor Flaherty visited Colonel Kappler in prison, forgave him, and eventually received him into the Church.

Let me tell you another story of hardship and courage. In 1775, St. Junipero Serra and Fr. Francisco Palou, Serra's fellow Franciscan and friend, accompanied a Spanish exploratory expedition from San Diego to the legendary Bay of Monterey. The Spanish soldiers and explorers traveled on horseback. Fr. Serra made the trek on foot, despite an enduring and painful infection in his leg due to insect bites, from which he had suffered ever since the very first day he arrived in the New World.

The expedition ultimately found and explored Monterrey Bay. They then resumed their journey, crossing over the Foothill mountains northeast of present-day Santa Cruz. They finally reached, and became the first Europeans to view, a great bay which was so enormous that it almost seemed an inland sea. On the shores of the bay, Fr. Palou raised the cross of Christ for a new Mission church. He named the mission in honor of Saint Francis, the humble friar who had begun the Franciscan movement four centuries earlier. It was the sixth of what later became the chain of 21 California Franciscan missions. Today, one can visit that same holy place, near present Market Street, in the city named after Mission San Francisco.

That's it, Dear Serrans. I hope that you have a very pleasant October and All Saints Day!

A VOCATION STORY FROM A MEMBER OF A SECULAR INSTITUTE

Natasha Sager is a member of a Secular Institute called **Caritas Christi**. Serra Club invited her to share her vocation story. Here are two interesting facts about her. Natasha was born with a rare brain malformation called Schizencephaly that caused her to have Cerebral Palsy. Having a physical disability did not stop her from pursuing a vocation in consecrated life.

Natasha came from a non-religious family, but from a young age she had an innate desire to know God. She was baptized when she was 15, and went through RCIA when she was 27. In 2014, she felt a calling to consecrated life and began researching the possibility of entering a religious community. She also learned about different forms of consecrated life such as Religious Institute (Cloistered/Active), Secular Institutes, Hermits, Consecrated Virgins, Society's of Apostolic Life and (Optional) Widows.

Natasha landed on the Secular Institute where men and women are called to consecrate their lives in the world through the profession of the evangelical counsels (poverty, chastity, and obedience). They do not receive a special title, are financially independent, and may work for the Church but most work secular jobs. Communal living is not necessary but there are small fraternal groups that live together; however, most do not. Regular meetings and retreats are scheduled that focus on formation, prayer, and community bonding.

Here is how her discernment process came about. Natasha came across a website and discovered the different communities of Secular Institutes in the U.S. She reached out to a Secular Institute with a contact in Minnesota called the Missionaries of the Kingship of Christ. Because of her disability, she was redirected to the Franciscan Missionaries of Jesus Crucified. She applied and was accepted, but within a year she did not feel called to stay with them and discerned out. So, was God calling her to a different vocation? She went back to dating while at the same time also discerned becoming a Third Order Carmelite.

Later, Natasha revisited websites again and enjoyed reading about different communities. That is when she came upon a community called **Caritas Christi**, where the charism is to make God known and loved in ones providential circumstances. In this community, having a disability would not be an impediment to joining. It was her lightbulb moment. She contacted the community and started a dialogue with them. She wanted to know more but was told she needed to take the "next step" to learn more. This made her nervous because she was still discerning with the Third Order Carmelites. As a result, Natasha took a step back to pray about it. She attended a "Healing the Whole Person Retreat," where she gained confidence and peace and was then ready to ask to take the next step. She started her 9 month preparation with **Caritas Christi** on February 1, 2018. She officially entered on November 1, 2018 and started her 3 years of initial formation. On September 14, 2021, she made her first Dedication and is now in her 4th year of temporary profession. God willing, she will make her Definitive Dedication in the Summer of 2026.

What is **Caritas Christi**? It was founded in Marseilles, France in 1937 by a Dominican priest, Fr. Joseph Marie Perrin, and a Dominican lay woman, Juliette Molland. Together they wanted to raise up lay women all over the world totally given to God in the midst of the world for love of Christ and His Church. They were originally called "The Little Sister of St. Catherine of Siena," but early on changed their name to *Caritas Christi urget nos* (The Love of Christ compels us).

The purpose of **Caritas Christi** is to form and give the Church contemplative and apostolic lay women consecrated in the Church and for the Church, giving themselves in all settings of life. The Charism is to love God and make Him loved. The spirituality is a life lived in the sight of the Father who sees what is done in secret. Their prayer life includes daily Mass, the Divine Office (Morning, Evening, and Night prayer), and praying the **Caritas**

ST. CHARLES ANNUAL PARISH AND SCHOOL CELEBRATION





Finally, the Secular Institutes embody the "Christian faithful living in the world, striving for the perfection of charity, and working for the sanctification of the world, especially from within . . . where their presence acts as leaven in the world." (Catechism, 929)

SERRA CLUB OF NORTH-MINNEAPOLIS BOARD MEETING MINUTES

00/10/20

Board Members Present: Ken Cobian, Maureen Collins, Judie Collodora, Mark Eastham, MaryAnne Frank, Rosemary Franzese, Jo Lohnes, Judy Makowske, Ted McCrossan, Tim Regan, Norma Swanson. Another Serran present by phone: Marilyn Zappia.

Meeting Opened with prayer led by **President T Regan** at 8:50 am. Minutes from the previous meeting on 8/19/25 were moved, seconded, and approved.

Communications: J Makowske and N Swanson: J Makowske reminded us to sign up for the annual retreat at Christ the King Retreat Center with either the available forms or online and submitting the \$50 fee. At the next board mtg she would like a list of members planning to attend the District Mtg on Friday before the retreat begins in the evening, because it's a separate registration handled by the District Treasurer, Charlene Zachman. Christ the King Retreat Center has notified us that the magnificent Center is going to be offered for sale, thus limiting opportunities for future retreats. Next, J Makowske reported on the continuing development of our website by Mary Krawcznnski and is pleased and amazed by all that is included. It is available to view in its early stage by opening the home page and navigating to all the other website options. Discussion followed about what to include and exclude in the future posting of our monthly newsletter online, such as the names and photos of students attending the vocation bus trips, for which we've been advised signed permission of parents will be required. It was decided to exclude board meeting minutes from the website but to email them separately each month to members of our club. It was decided to retain the Monthly Prayer Request for Priests in the website newsletter but to also make it available on our website. Opinions were offered about the inclusion of contact information of Cub Officers in the website newsletter, followed by a motion to refer the issue to Michelle Eastham, Mary Krawcznnski, and Judy Makowske.

Vocation Bus Trips: J McGuire and M Eastham: M Eastham opened up discussion on soliciting funding for our Vocation Bus Trips including grants in view of the high cost of renting buses and increased needs this year due to the participation of more students. "No money, no mission." J Makowske raised a concern about applying for grants to the Serra International Foundation because grants are usually awarded for development of programs, not operations. K Cobian's list of Foundation grantees echoed the recipients as world wide developers of programs. M Zappia was in favor of considering application to the Foundation because we meet the criteria, it meets our mission, our mission is very unique and other clubs could learn about this mission from us by our participation. Finally, the answer will be no unless we at least ask. MA Frank mentioned grants need a letter of approval of our ArchBishop and we currently have two high priority items on his desk. Passionate reasons were voiced by M Collins and J Collodora. President T Regan suggested we not substitute our decision for the Foundations. A motion to submit an application to the Foundation passed 6 to 4. That was amended to submit an application in 2026 and refer the submission to a committee passed unanimously. Next, M Eastham provided the planning done for our fall Vocation Bus Trips by Jim McGuire that has required much perseverance and time in the process of establishing relationships with two new vocation sites: the Jesuits at Demontreville Retreat House and the adjacent cloistered Carmelite Monastery. Additionally, this will be a first involvement for St John the Baptist School, with 47 students signed up, and including (tentatively) either Fr. Paul or Fr. Derek. The Oct 27 tentative agenda includes arrival at 9:30, at 10 the boys will go to the Jesuit Chapel and the girls to the Carmelite Monastery. After preparation for interaction with the cloistered sisters, they will all meet for mass at 11 in the Jesuit Chapel which seats 70, followed by lunch, then tours, and departure at 12:30. The Oct 29 trip is being planned for St Raphael and Sacred Heart (pending) students who will visit SJV and SPS and Little Sisters. The Nov 12 trip is being planned with Immaculate Conception and St Charles (tentatively) students.

Vocations: MA Frank and M Szydlik: MA Frank is in the process of restoring and updating an earlier Serra program and booklet titled "Homebound and Suffering Prayer Apostolate," circa 2003, which seeks to unite pain and suffering with Christ's by way of prayers offered for an increase in vocations to the priesthood and religious life. She's filled with gratitude for Michelle Eastham for creating a new digital file of the booklet. The booklet has been sent to ArchBishop Hebda to obtain his approval and to insert his personal greeting before going to print. This program was presented several weeks ago to Judy Cozzens and Moia, Vocations Dir for Serra USA, who had requested the information and it was well received. Their intent is to use our materials as a template for the Sparks program. Next, Priesthood Sunday is Sept 28. The St Charles Borromeo spiritual bouquet sign-up sheets for Fr Przybilla and Fr Lynch (who offers Mon AM Mass) are available at the mtg. Michelle Eastham has designed a very beautiful cover picture of the Eucharist above a chalice for a framed presentation of the spiritual bouquet gift sheets and a tally of the individual gifts. St John the Baptist has requested framed pictures for presentations to their two priests and the Pomeroys are providing the same for Epiphany. Next, prayers will continue for another year for newer Serra clubs in New Ulm, MN and Helena, MT dioceses, making note of personnel changes.

Membership: M Collins and J Collodora: M Collins passed out documents regarding new member applications for Serra International. The current one-page application is lacking in information needed for membership in our club. Working together, M Collins and M Zappia formatted a 'page 2' addendum to include the following information: a list of committee opportunities with place to designate choice, a list of membership classifications and dues, and several other personal info questions.
