# **VOCATION BUS TRIP**

A total of 18 girls and 14 boys attended, and this was the first retreat where both the boys and girls went to the same religious site. Father Kevin met the group and we walked over to a statue of St. Ignatius of Loyola. The Jesuit order was founded in 1540 by Ignatius of Loyola and six companions with the approval of Pope Paul III. The Society of Jesus is the largest religious order in the Catholic Church and has played a significant role in education, charity, humanitarian acts, and global policies. The story of St. Ignatuis is beautiful and will be covered in another future article. Jesuits are a contemplative order. St. Ignatius put together a silent prayer period of 150 prayers whereby 5 are recited per day for a total of 150 days. Father Kevin emphasized God's Will and how He loves us and how the enemy wants us to place our will first. The boys were very engaged. Father was great at getting getting them to interact with him. You could feel the Jesuit presence with the teaching that was occurring.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

## THE LORD HEARS THE CRY OF THE POOR

The Holy Father has issued an Apostolic Exhortation Dilexi Te (I Have Loved You), his first official message to the whole world. It's a corker.

The background of the letter is that when Pope Leo XIV assumed office, he found an unfinished draft of this very letter on Pope Francis' desk. Earlier, Pope Francis had written the Apostolic Exhortation Dilexit Nos (He Has Loved Us), a reflection on the human and divine love of Jesus. Francis had intended the second letter as a follow-up, emphasizing the essential connection between Christ's love for us and

His command that we must love and care for the poor. Pope Leo says that when he found the unfinished draft, he decided to develop the letter and make it his own. We can be glad he did.

At the core of the Exhortation is this profound Incarnational truth: God's love and care for the poor comes to fulfillment in Jesus. Pope Francis and Pope Leo both remind us of St. Paul's great theme: "He emptied Himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in human likeness." (Philemon 2:7) From the moment Jesus entered the world, He was poor with the poor. The "Good News" that He brought is good news for the poor: "God is near, and He loves you." That explains Christ's saying in the Beatitudes "Blessed are the poor, for theirs is the kingdom of God." The poor inherit the kingdom because of God's "preference" for the poor.

The Psalmist says, The Lord hears the cry of the poor! Pope Leo points out that poverty is more than just material destitution. There are many forms of poverty in today's world: cultural and spiritual poverty, boredom, fragility, fear caused by the internet, and the empty sterility of mechanical sex without the desire for children.

From my own point of view as a Serran, I found it striking that Pope Leo starts his letter at a surprising point: the story of Moses and the Burning Bush. Yahweh says to Moses: "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them.... So, I send you."

Just as God sent Moses, Pope Leo says, so God sends us. He sends the Church as his emissary of Good News for the Poor. Pope St. John Paul II was fond of saying: the Church makes the Eucharist, and the Eucharist makes the Church. We Serrans have an important mission which is to pray for vocations, to pray for priests, so that the Church can keep bringing the Eucharist, and the healing good News, to the poor. Siempre Adelante, etc!!!

# **SEPTEMBER 9, 2025** ST. MICHAEL BROADCASTING

The Serra Club of North-Minneapolis invited Michael Bird to speak to our members. He is the volunteer President of Saint Michael Broadcasting, a Catholic television station. He shared his story with us as well as a topic he has been diving into of late—in vitro fertilization (IVF) and the rights of the unborn.

Michael Bird was born in Minneapolis and came from a close-knit family with two brothers and sisters. He attended Annunciation grade school from kindergarten through 8th grade, and was taught by dedicated Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa, Wisconsin, who he did not appreciate fully until later in life. He says he still remembers asking Sister, "Why don't we genuflect when we come back to our pew after receiving communion?" To which she replied, "Well, Michael, what you have to realize is, at that moment, you are a tabernacle."

Michael then attended Benilde High School, and enjoyed his time there, too much, but again did not take advantage of the educational opportunities afforded him as he should. In later years, he had many different entry level jobs. He was employed by the Minneapolis Public Schools for a very short time as a laborer and saw how poorly some of the public schools were run. He realized how blessed he had been to have attended Annunciation and Benilde.

Eventually, Michael received a degree in business from the University of Minnesota and became a stockbroker. Taking more interest in his faith, he did quite a bit of religious reading and watched a small local Catholic television station called Catholic Views Broadcasts. When the husband of the couple that was running it died in 2008, Michael was asked to take over the station. With the help of his wife and many volunteers since, he has managed the station.

Saint Michael Broadcasting, Channel 14 and formerly Catholic Views Broadcasts, is a Catholic, low power, over the air (not cable) television station broadcasting from the top of the IDS Tower in Minneapolis. The signal reaches about 40 miles from downtown Minneapolis, though some living farther away, such as in St. Cloud, Faribault, Hutchinson and western Wisconsin are able to receive the signal. They are completely funded by viewer contributions and staffed by volunteers. They are a non-profit 501(C)3 corporation.

And now for the topic of "in vitro fertilization (IVF)." Here is an excerpt of an article Michael wrote for The Catholic Servant this past January 2025. It is called "IVF and the rights of the Unborn."

What is meant by the term in vitro fertilization? The word "vitro" comes from the Latin word meaning "glass." Therefore, in vitro fertilization means "fertilized in glass." Human beings who come into existence this way are more commonly called "test tube babies." In the broad sense, however, the term "in vitro fertilization" means "obtaining a human conception in a manner other than through the sexual union of a man and a woman."

### SISTER MARY ANNE SCHAENZER

For Sister Mary Anne Schaenzer, the past 60 years have been a wonderful gift. She was 20 years old when, on July 17, 1965, she took her first vows with the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND), followed by her final vows in the summer of 1970. Our Serra Club invited her to come and share the history of her Order and update us with the status of the Order today.

The **School Sisters of Notre Dame** is an international congregation of about 1,700 women religious. The community was founded in 1833 by Blessed Theresa of Jesus Gerhardinger in Bavaria. The School Sisters of Notre Dame live and minister in 27 countries on five continents and continue to share in Christ's mission to proclaim the good news of God's reign. The Generalate is in Rome, Italy. They are organized into ten provinces of which two are in North America.

**The French Connection:** The original Congregation of Notre Dame was founded near the close of the 16<sup>th</sup> Century in France. During the "French Revolution "and the general ruin which followed in its train, the house ... were suppressed ... the last to be confiscated in 1809. The Congregation was reestablished in Germany in 1833.

SSND came to the United States in 1847 ... landing in New York and moving on to Pennsylvania. They have been serving in the Mankato area since 1865. As the name implies, they are a teaching Order.

When Sister Mary Anne entered the Community in 1963 – first vows in 1965 – most of the Sisters were teaching in Schools. There were always some Sisters who served in House Care basically cooking but doing other tasks also. The first community in which Sister lived as a teacher had 42 Sisters. One prepared all the meals, one did the laundry (that is a lot of bedding alone), and one helped both of them. The rest of them taught full time in either the grade school or high school. This was in Mankato, Minnesota which was just one parish grade school. There were two others in Mankato and one in North Mankato. The Catholic High School was for everyone. Eventually there was one school for all 7-8<sup>th</sup> graders, and each parish had its one grade school. Again eventually, all K-6th graders were in one school. Today, K-12 are all in one building on Good Counsel Hill, Catholic School.

The types of Ministries, involved in various types of education, has evolved over the years. Here in the Twin Cities, there are some special SSND ministries that bear highlighting:

Theresa Living Center/Caroline Family Services – (1987 - present) The Theresa Living Center provides housing for single women who find themselves homeless or in an abusive situation. This residential program, located in the former convent of St. Casimir's Catholic Church, initially served 12 expectant mothers or women with children.

**MORE** – (1980's - present) MORE began in the 1980's in the McDonough Housing Community in St. Paul. The School Sisters of Notre Dame saw an opportunity to attend to the needs of the Southeast Asian refugee residents when observing the cultural barriers limiting them from fully engaging in their wider community.

**East Side Learning Center (ESLC)** – (2001 - present) The School Sisters of Notre Dame founded the ESLC and ever since it has been supporting the local community's most vulnerable children including those facing barriers to education such as homelessness, poverty, trauma, disabilities, and racial bias.





# ARCHDIOCESAN PASSPORT ADVENTURE

The Archdiocese of St. Paul & Minneapolis is celebrating their 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of it's founding on July 19, 1850. Archbishop Hebda invited Catholics to become Archdiocesan Jubilee Pilgrims by visiting seven parishes other than our own, much like Saint Philip Neri who led the faithful of his day to seven churches in Rome. St. Alphonsus in Brooklyn Center, selected Saturday, October 25<sup>th</sup> as our pilgrimage day.





Our tour was led by Redemptorist Transitional Deacon Steve Urban and began in the St. Alphonsus parking lot for an opening prayer and then headed to the Cathedral of St. Paul. The next stop was at St. Peter Claver in the Frogtown area of St. Paul where we were met by Permanent Deacon Will Pitts. This parish is made up of primarily black parishioners. To honor their culture and vocations, they displayed framed photos in their narthex of Cardinal Wilton Gregory and six black American Bishops, as well as six holy black American men and women religious.

We moved on to Holy Rosary, the first parish my husband and I joined after we were married. I thought it was interesting that three of the four parishes of my married life were stops on this pilgrimage. We passed by a large homeless encampment under an overpass just a few blocks from the church. This parish is located in the Little Earth neighborhood of Minneapolis close to the George Floyd site and is primarily made up of American Indians and Hispanics. Inside the church was a literature table, including quite a number of our *Serra Collection of Favorite Prayers* in Spanish. The Parish has an outdoor neighborhood Rosary Procession scheduled for the following week.

Following a lunch break, we headed over to Ascension parish. We were greeted by Francisco Escamilla Jr., the Faith Formation Director. His dad, Francisco Sr., is a biblical and philosophy professor at St. Thomas University. This parish gives out free food in their narthex after Mass on the first and third Sundays of each month.

At 3:00 pm, we received an official tour at the Basilica conducted by a docent. Our pastor, Fr. John Schmidt, joined our pilgrimage at the Basilica. Built in 1914, this was the first Basilica in the US and was later named a Co-Cathedral, after the archdiocese elected to remain intact rather than split into separate St. Paul and Minneapolis Archdioceses. The church will be closing next year for renovations. During construction, Mass will be held in the upper basement with a capacity of 500. One of my favorite chapels honored Our Lady of Lavang commemorating when Blessed Mother appeared to a group of persecuted Catholics in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. #### St. Michael Broadcasting continued . . .

What is wrong with IVF, and why should we oppose it? In vitro fertilization is wrong because the unborn child has rights. The child has the right to be conceived in an act of sexual love by his parents. He has the right to be protected from coming into existence in a laboratory, where he might be placed in his mother's womb, or a stranger's womb, discarded, used for research, or frozen for future use.

Both contraception and abortion have fostered the belief that we have the "right to do what we want with our own bodies." We do not. We are stewards of our bodies, not owners. The unborn child is not a "product of conception," a manufactured "thing," but a human being. Donum Vitae, the 1987 Instruction on Respect for Human Life, warns: "the abortion mentality . . . leads, whether one wants it to or not, to man's dominion over the life and death of his fellow human beings and can lead to a system of radical eugenics."

Unfortunately, "theologians" and "moralists" have not effectively communicated the truth about the immorality and consequences of IVF. It's up to us, the laity, to speak up, and act!

### Demontreville Bus Trip continued ...

The Demontreville retreat house is run by three Jesuit priests. It was started in 1948 and is located in Lake Elmo, MN. They host silent men's retreats from Thursday evening to Sunday every weekend with the exception of five weekends per year. The men receive 14 different talks along with confession and Mass during the retreat. We learned that Serran Larry Gillespie, who came on the trip, has been on retreat there every year for 35 years!

Jim McGuire and MaryAnne led thirteen 8th grade girls uphill from the retreat house to the Carmelite Monastery which was somewhat hidden by trees. They watched as Jim pressed a button and waited for a musical chime that welcomed us. Inside was a simple waiting room built of concrete blocks with 3 closed doors, lending to the mystery. After we assembled into the room, we noted a turnstile made of metal and wood as well as a small, round, perforated that became intercom our means communication with an unseen sister.



The girls adapted to this new and strange way of communicating, asking the sister about their habits (brown) and what "Discalced" meant (Carmelite rule is similar to that of the Franciscans meaning they are "unshod" or without shoes

wearing sandals with no stockings as a means of living in poverty). Sister was asked how she knew that she was being called to serve God in this way and we received a lengthy answer. Another student asked Sister whether they had any technology available to them. As Sister spoke, the turnstile opened to reveal a shelf where one of the girls placed a bag of groceries. This enabled us to see how the sisters communicate and receive necessities without leaving their Carmel.


Both boys and girls gathered for Mass at the retreat center. The feedback after the trip was very positive and we hope to add this to our regular schedule of vocation site visits in the future. traditional Vietnamese clothing was a round mosaic of a mother pelican and her three chicks. Blood was dripping from the mother's beak. Apparently, a pelican will pluck pieces of her own body and feed it to her young if she cannot find any other food. The image signifies Christ sacrificing His own body for His love of humanity.

Our last stop at 4:15 pm, was at Annunciation in south Minneapolis, the parish that was victim to the horrific shooting during a school Mass on August 27, 2025. The plan was to tour the site and stay for the 5:00 pm Mass, which is currently being held in the school auditorium. The pastor, Fr. Dennis Zehren, formerly of St. Vincent de Paul, introduced my pastor and seminarian to the congregation at the start of Mass just before he led the faithful in the Archdiocesan Vocations Prayer. Fr. John concelebrated Mass and Deacon Steve served during Mass. At the end of Mass, Fr. Zehren asked everyone to pray for Deacon Steve in advance of his ordination next spring. After Mass, he surprised the congregation by announcing that the pews in the church were about to be replaced and invited anyone who wanted to process out of the auditorium with him to have a look inside the church.

The mood was very somber and everyone was quiet and respectful. The stained-glass windows had already been repaired. Approximately 30 pews had blue painters tape marking the spots where bullets had punctured or grazed the wood. One of the pews also had a small framed photo of one of the young deceased students propped up on the seat. It was heartbreaking. The door on the east side wall just to the left of the altar still had three bullet holes. Many parishes and organizations had donated rosaries, Miraculous Medals, Holy Water containers, and prayer cards, to which Fr. Zehren invited us to help ourselves. Our St. Alphonsus Archdiocesan Passport Adventure ended with a prayer outside on this rainy, blustery day near the display of flowers outside the front of The Church of the Annunciation.
