PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

STABAT MATER

I grew up in a Benedictine parish. Therefore, on Fridays during Lent when the Sisters took us across the playground to our tiny parish church for Stations, we always used the "Way of the Cross" pamphlet published by [Liturgical Press](#), Collegeville, Minnesota. If you don't own a copy, I strongly recommend that you [order one](#) from Lit Press, for the low, low price of \$2.20, and use it in your Lenten devotions this year.

I am looking at my copy right now. What brings up strong emotions and memories for me is the Stabat Mater hymn. One stanza of the song is sung at each station. The melody is ancient, simple, and sorrowful. With the prayers at each station, much of the texts taken from the Passion itself, it is a stunningly beautiful and evocative work of liturgical art.

There are several theories about the actual composer of the Stabat Mater. The strongest candidate, apparently, is Pope Innocent III, which is interesting, because he was a very powerful and important pope in his era. But he was also a brilliant scholar, one of the greatest of the early Italian Renaissance. The hymn is frequently used for Stations of the Cross formats, but is also part of the official liturgy on the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows, celebrated each year on September 15.

Every verse of the poem, every sentence and thought, is beautiful, strikingly simple, and sad. **At the Cross her station keeping, Stood the mournful Mother weeping, Close to Jesus to the last.....**That's the very first line, and it puts you right there, "standing" next to her, shocked at the tragedy of the scene.

The Third Station: **Gracious Mother, Font of Love, Touch My Spirit from above, Make my heart with yours accord.....**Fourth Station: **Make me feel as You have felt; Make my soul to glow and melt; with the love of Christ My Lord!....**

Do you see what I mean by "evocative?"

The poem does not hold back from the reality and brutality of the execution - Fifth Station: **Bruised, derided, cursed, defiled; She beheld her tender Child; All with bloody scourges rent.....** Twelfth Station: **Let His stripes and scourgings smite me; At His Holy Cross requite me; Let his blood refresh me there!**

I'm signing off for now, dear Serrans, except for these reminders:

SPEAKER HIGHLIGHTS

A CONVERSION STORY by Jo Lohnes

Our Serra Club welcomed Darray Hartig, a soon-to-be mother of five, married to Dan Hartig, having met him while serving 7 ½ years in the US Navy that finalized in September 2015. While in the Navy, she completed nuclear power school and became a legal officer learning the UCMJ (Uniform Code of Military Justice). In the spring of 2009, she uncovered a sailor stealing mail and identities taking thousands of dollars. The sailor was found guilty and thrown into the brig. As legal officer, she was obliged to visit him in the brig which was her first experience ever visiting a prison. Stay tuned, there is more to come on prison visits.

Religion-wise at 10:00 p.m. every night on deployment, the chaplain would come and, over the announcing system, conduct nighttime prayer, which she enjoyed. She got out of the military in 2015 and was pregnant with her first child. At that point she was kind of Presbyterian, but they moved and found a Methodist Church where she liked the pastor and his homilies. Her husband encouraged her to join a bible study, which she did. In time, she became familiar with scripture and practicing it.

Scripture becomes real when you start hearing and applying it. It was Matthew 25 vs 37-40 that hit home. **“Then the just will ask him: Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you or see you thirsty and give you drink? When did we welcome you away from home or clothe you in your nakedness? When did we visit you when you were ill or in prison? The king will answer them: I assure you, as often as you did it for one of my least brothers, you did it for me.”** She began her spiritual journey walking more and more with Christ and taking things a little bit more seriously.

In December 2019, she, her husband, and three children moved to Minnesota. Her husband had just become Catholic earlier in 2019 and they decided to send their first born to pre-school at Saint Charles Borromeo. She made the decision to become Catholic and do this journey together as a family, so she took OCIA classes and converted in 2021. She jumped in with both feet becoming president of Women’s Council and is currently still in that role. Additionally, Darray is now leading a women’s bible study out of her living room.

In that capacity, she met Jeromy who works for a non-profit called “The Redemption Project.” He got wind that Darray leads a women’s bible study and they were looking for some female mentors, having just launched a women’s cohort. He came to speak about it at the women’s bible study.

So, what is The Redemption Project? Their mission is: From Prison to Purpose, the Power of Partnership. Unleashing Redemption through empowerment that transforms lives, where education inspires, partnerships strengthen and hope ignites change.

In April 2024, Darray started her personal journey with an inmate, Melissa, after receiving her profile. Melissa was found guilty of transporting illegal aliens. Darray found herself hesitant having never dealt with this or seen people like this. Through some starts and stops and starts, she was able to get to know Melissa and chit-chatted back and forth and finally talked on the phone.

In October 2024, Darray had the opportunity to take a Sunday and visit Melissa in prison in Waseca, Minnesota. It was October 23, 2024, when Melissa got out of prison. Darray thought she would be able to take her to the airport, but it did not work out. Melissa flew back to Arizona and her boyfriend picked her up. He got her a cell phone, and they were living together in a trailer park. All was going well until it wasn’t. He became physical and she had to get out of the situation by escaping to a motel in Apache Junction, Arizona. In need of some cash, Melissa asked Darray. Darray took a deep breath and was able to get Melissa some cash and in turn contacted someone at the Redemption Project to help.

With the goal being to get Melissa to Minnesota by Thanksgiving, many prayers had to be answered and a miracle or two had to occur. Indeed, Melissa was able to sit at Darray’s Thanksgiving table in 2024.

Fast forward: Melissa is now a general manager at the Speedway in Plymouth. She works hard for a single paycheck, she stays clean and will never go back. Darray looks back and remembers the scripture and what we are called to do . . . what we do for the least of these we’re doing for Jesus.

On February 2, the Canons Regular of Jesus the Lord, the Sisters of Charity of St. Anne and our community of Sisters in Jesus the Lord, gathered for the World Day of Consecrated Life. Over supper, each priest, brother or sister was invited to share something related to his/her vocation as a religious. Some brought a picture from when they became a novice or took vows, others told the story of how they first got interested in Russia and eventually made it here! Fr. Myron, the founder of our brother Canons and also founding pastor of our parish here, shared that he got interested in Russia at a young age, because the refrigerator factory where his father worked was asked to change production to airplane wings to assist Russia in World War II. Later, we realized that each one of us is here in Vladivostok because of Fr. Myron’s “yes” to his own vocation, which eventually led to the reopening of the Catholic church here in the Russian far East.

He must be a U.S. citizen or a resident alien with a green card and a permanent resident in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. 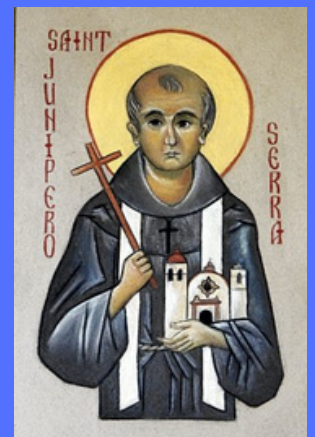
