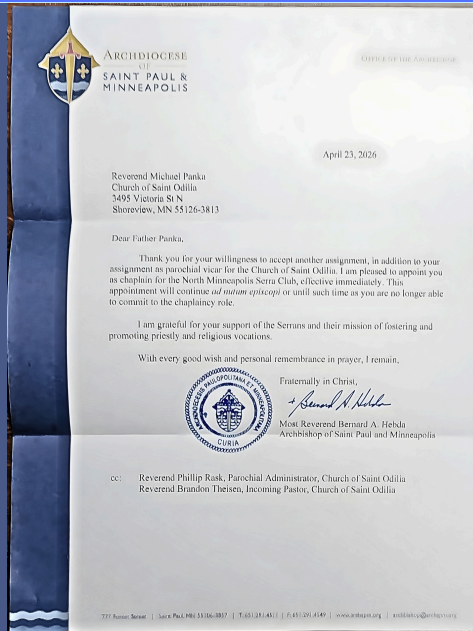
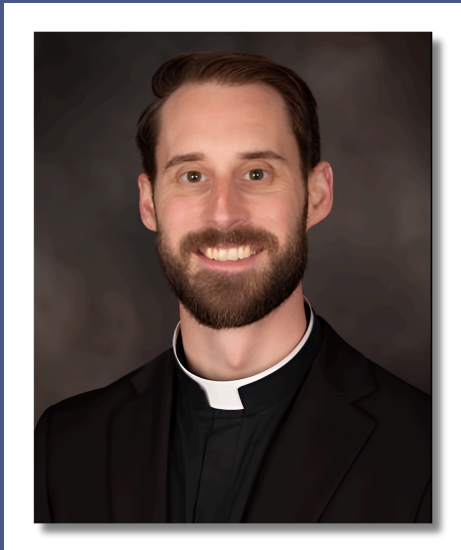

- At age 13 he felt his first calling to the priesthood after reading a book about St. Columba; a very clear calling came during prayer while attending the University of St. Thomas
- "Incredibly shy" while growing up, he overcame that in part through his participation in the Labourer Society which allowed him to overcome his college debt before entering the priesthood
- His passions of teaching and music are sure to benefit us; prior to becoming a priest he taught at Holy Family Academy
- He was ordained a priest on May 25, 2024, and is currently serving as parochial vicar at the Church of St. Odilia

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

SACRAMENT, MYSTERY, AND RECONCILIATION

In our newsletter issue last month, I mentioned that in his General Audiences Pope Leo is embarking with us on a new study of Vatican II and its teachings. He has continued this by examining Lumen Gentium, the Constitution on the Mystery of the Church. The Council, he says, employs the term “mystery” with great care, not to mean something obscure, but rather the opposite, as used by St. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians: a “mystery” that has been hidden for all our history, but is now brought to the full light of reality.

The “hidden” mystery is that, by his death, Christ has reconciled us to God our Father, and brings all of humanity together as one. Satan, the great Divider, has been conquered. Our human nature, which was torn asunder by sin, has been restored. The Church is the sign, that is, the sacrament (a word derived from the Latin) or the “mystery,” (derived from the Greek) of this healing and reconciliation.

It's impossible to reflect on the great truth of Lumen Gentium without remembering the wonderful story of the two disciples at Emmaus. They are walking together on the day after Jesus' resurrection. They are leaving Jerusalem, heading back to Galilee (i.e., the wrong direction!). Along the way they meet Jesus, but they do not recognize him. They say to him, “Are you the only one who does not know all the things that have occurred these past few days in Jerusalem? ‘What things, Jesus asks innocently. They tell him, and then Jesus proceeds to explain the whole of scripture to them, and all the passages that relate to Himself. Alas, they still don't quite get it. But, when they reach the town and sit down for a meal together, “...They recognized him in the breaking of the Bread.”

Dear Serrans: the Emmaus disciples are us, our humanity, in microcosm. We are traveling in the wrong direction, away from our brothers and sisters. Without Jesus, we know the basic facts, but we don't understand what they mean. We don't get it, until Jesus helps us to recognize the reality of what he has done, through the Eucharist.

Jesus gave us the Eucharist; he gave us the Church which is His Body; and the priesthood, to preserve the Eucharist for all generations. He gave us Pope Leo XIV, the successor of Peter. The sacred ministry of the Catholic priesthood is our precious heritage. Think of it like the Viaticum: after mass, the priest entrusts the consecrated host to us laypeople, to bring home to those who need it. It's our vocation.

Our job as Serrans is to give service to the priests of our archdiocese. Let's do it.

CATHOLIC SERVICES APPEAL

Marci Franzen is the Director of the annual **Catholic Services Appeal (CSA)** and has been in the position for the past two years. She came to our Serra members to share what **CSA** is all about.

The **Catholic Services Appeal** began serving our archdiocese in 1959. Over the past 67 years, its reach has expanded and deepened to provide Christian assistance to thousands of people in the larger archdiocese. Today, the **CSA** raises over \$8.5 million annually and supports ministries in three primary areas: Education, Discipleship and Evangelization, and Humanitarian Care.

The **CSA** relies on gifts from the faithful throughout the archdiocese to support the day-to-day needs of ministries central to our faith. They are simply too large for one parish to support alone. Together, we are able to grow in faith, serve those in need, educate our youth, and respect life at all stages.

CSA ministries fall into three categories:

Educate in Faith—An essential component of the Church's ministry is the education of the next generation of disciples, as well as the continuing formation of all its members. It is accomplished through:

- Elementary and High School Scholarships and Grants
- Drexel Mission School Support
- College Campus Ministry
- Seminarian Support

Help Those in Need—The Church is called to make the love of Jesus tangible in the world today, especially to the poor, the vulnerable, and those on the peripheries. This includes:

- Shelter, Housing & Food Insecurity programs
- Hospital Ministry
- Prison Ministry
- Respect Life Outreach
- Life Fund Emergency Services

Discipleship and Evangelization—At the heart of the Church's ministry is facilitating for its members an encounter with the person of Jesus Christ. Central to what it means to be Catholic is the development of a friendship with Jesus through prayer and reflection. This includes:

- Marriage, Family and Youth Programs
- Latino Ministry Programs
- Indian Ministry
- Deaf Ministry
- Archdiocesan Council for Catholic Women



Giving is Faith in Action

The way **Catholic Services Appeal** stays current with ministry needs is by regular visits with ministry partners, requests for impact statements and with parish and pastor meetings. The CSA provides financial support to ministries extending throughout the greater Archdiocese of Saint Paul & Minneapolis. The Archdiocese consists of 12 counties over 6,000 square miles, with approximately 720,000 Catholics.

ST ALPHONSUS HAS A NEWLY ORDAINED REDEMPTORIST PRIEST

After nine years in formation, Deacon Steve Urban was ordained a Redemptorist priest on April 18, 2026 at the Shrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Kansas City, MO. The ordination was officiated by Cardinal Archbishop Joseph Tobin of Newark, NJ, who is also a Redemptorist, formally known as the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (CSsR).

In his homily, Cardinal Tobin said, "Steve bears the name of the first deacon in history (Stephen), and therefore he should know that following Christ is not always easy. Steven has chosen the Redemptorists, so he will go to preach not only Christ, but the Abundant Redemption. That is, dying with Christ to be resurrected with him."

Father Urban was born in 1988 in Salina, KS, where his parents and younger brother still live. He graduated from Kansas State with a Master of Accountancy in 2012, after which he spent five years working as a tax accountant. His career took him to Kansas City where he met the Redemptorists.

At first, his interest was piqued by the preaching of Father Denis Ryan, CSsR, especially his ability to draw on his practical life experience prior to priesthood. As a young professional Fr. Ryan's approach helped him see how the Gospel spoke directly to his life. Then, getting to know other Redemptorist priests assigned to Kansas City gave him the support and encouragement he needed to make the important decision to enter the seminary.

Father Urban has been assigned to St. Alphonsus Parish in Brooklyn Center, MN as a seminarian, and then as deacon, for the past two years. He says that his time in the Twin Cities has been challenging for many of St. Al's parishioners who were reluctant to leave their homes due to the presence of ICE agents. For nearly two months, he delivered food and held Communion services in parishioner's homes. It was difficult to see the financial and emotional toll these circumstances placed them in, yet it was also a privilege to talk and pray with them.

He will return to St. Alphonsus after his ordination and looks forward to working with the Retrouvaille program and supporting their youth group. Serra member and parishioner Maureen Collins has been talking with Fr. Urban about introducing the Newman Connection program to parish graduating high school students and parents.

Father Steve Urban says, "I am excited to see how God will use me!"

SEMINARIANS VS PRIESTS BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

The Annual Priests vs Seminarians Basketball Tournament was held on Friday, April 17, 2026 at Hill Murray High School in Maplewood, MN. Saint John Vianney Seminary (SVJ) played the Saint Paul Seminary (SPS) in the first game. Although it was hard fought, the SPS seminarians won handily.

SPS was back on the court to compete against local priests for the second game of the evening. Again, the SPS seminarians were the victors, although the priests nearly sent the game into overtime, with final score of 51-50. Top scorers amongst the priests were: Father Joseph Wappes, parochial vicar of St. Joseph in West St. Paul; Father Chris Yanta, parochial vicar of Holy Name of Jesus in Medina; and Father Aaron Nett, pastor of Holy Cross in Harding, St. Michael in Buckman, St. John Nepomuk in Lastrup, and St. Joseph in Pierz, which are all located in the Diocese of St. Cloud.

Father Nett brought his very own cheering squad complete with professional looking posters featuring playfully inspiring messages, such as - "We got spirit, yes we do, Holy Spirit lives in you," "He can't play but he can pray," and "Saving his energy for Sunday." His fan club was even more impressive considering his four parishes are all located in Morrison County which is over 100 miles northwest of the Twin Cities.

Other notables on "Team Priests" were Bishop Michael Izen and our very own Father Paul Shovelain, pastor of St. John the Baptist in New Brighton. Bishop Izen surprised the crowd when he walked in dressed in shorts and a hoodie, most attendees likely assumed he might be one of the coaches, instead he was a player!

Each team wore official uniforms. The priests were dressed in black t-shirts, easily identifiable, because they featured a clerical collar. Under his hoodie, Bishop Izen revealed the standard black t-shirt with clerical collar, in addition to a large, white pectoral cross and chain made with white tape which was affixed onto the t-shirt just prior to the game, according to Father Wappes.

Your intrepid reporter apologizes for not securing the names of the top scoring seminarians but sadly was too caught up in the excitement of the games to take notes. She did however enjoy a lovely conversation with Ryan Romens, father of Deacon Peter Romens, who will be ordained this May. Deacon Peter was a recipient of the Serra Club of North-Minneapolis Seminarian Award in both 2024 and 2025.

A highlight of the game was watching Archbishop Hebda. He graciously engaged with every single person who approached him. After his line finally died down (approximately two hours into the evening), the archbishop spent the rest of the night roaming the sidelines and bleachers, introducing himself to strangers who he left as friends. We are so blessed to have him as our shepherd!

The St. Paul Serra Club including Alan and Mary Egging, Magnus and Grace Meier, Jeff Brinkman, John Sprangers, and Kathleen Randolph (Serra District 7 Governor-Elect) ran the concession stand - hotdogs, chips, and Skittles were big sellers. Overall, the event was a wonderful chance to hobnob with bishops, meet new priests, get to know our seminarians, and spend time with fellow Serrans. This tournament is one of the most fun vocations events of the year. I encourage you to attend in 2027.

THE WHEELS ON THE BUS

It was a crisp spring morning on Thursday, April 9, when we departed from Sacred Heart with 21 eighth graders in tow. The boys' destinations were St. John Vianney Seminary (SJV) and St. Paul Seminary (SPS), while the girls headed to the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The boys were welcomed by two young, enthusiastic first-year seminarians, Marshall and James. After brief introductions, we headed into the St. John Vianney Chapel where each visit reveals something new. Above the altar are Latin phrases with profound meaning. What the seminarians see while seated in the chapel is "Beloved Son," while the priest, standing behind the altar, sees "Priest Forever."

Have you ever taken a close look at the crucifix in St. Mary's Chapel? You may notice that Jesus is not wearing a crown of thorns. Why is that? The seminarians are invited to wear the crown. The altar itself features the Alpha and Omega symbols on each side, with Jesus at the center signifying all of time. At the front of the chapel stand statues of St. Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary. These statues are over 100 years old and came from the original Nazareth Hall Preparatory Seminary, founded in 1923 by Archbishop Austin Dowling. It is wonderful that this modern chapel holds such a meaningful piece of history.

Both James and Marshall shared their discernment stories with the boys. James spoke about growing up in a family that was "lukewarm" in their faith. As a sophomore in high school, he heard a homily on repentance that stirred something within him. He began Adoration with the Blessed Sacrament and was confirmed during his junior year. He continued praying, asking, "Is there something more for me?" At his Confirmation, an unknown priest told him he would one day become a priest, planting a seed that would later grow. James was accepted into St. John Vianney Seminary just one week before graduating high school, and it is clear that he is truly on fire for Jesus.

Marshall, an only child who was homeschooled, shared that he became heavily involved in video games at the age of ten. Through online gaming, he was introduced to the "outside world." During this time, he formed an online friendship with a girl he met while playing games. Through this relationship, the Lord taught him how to love. Eventually, God asked him, "Do you love me?" Marshall responded, "I will give you everything if You are truly present in the Eucharist." After spending significant time in Adoration (common theme here), he came to know that God is real. It was an experience that changed his heart forever. Marshall shared that he desires to be a priest because he loves God, and you always want to be with the one you love.

Before heading to St. Paul Seminary, Marshall challenged the boys to a 100meter dash on the St. Thomas track. He won, and from that moment on, he was officially the coolest guy in the group.

At St. Paul Seminary, Father Pavlak, Director of Vocations for the Archdiocese met us and immediately brought us into St. Mary's Chapel, pointing out several highlights and statues. One especially interesting detail was the placement of the statues of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton and St. John Neumann, which directly face each other on opposite sides of the chapel. There is a reason for this: they were the first two American saints, canonized in 1975 and 1977, respectively.

The Venerable Fulton Sheen, who will be canonized on September 24, 2026, in St. Louis, spent his early seminary years at St. Paul Seminary, praying in this very chapel more than 100 years ago. After about 30 minutes with Fr. Pavlak, we returned to the St. Thomas Chapel for Mass, stopping briefly to watch a whiffle ball game at SJV. The boys enthusiastically cheered on James. We were blessed to have Mass celebrated by Fr. Bryan Pedersen, pastor of Sacred Heart and an alumnus of St. Paul Seminary, Class of 2004.

After the boys exited the bus at St John Vianney Seminary, the girls spent their time attentively learning about a religious vocation and in participating with the residents at Holy Family Residence, a.k.a., Little Sisters of the Poor. Once inside the facility, all eyes were on Sister Joseph Marie as she led the girls first outside to the lovely courtyard where several girls at a time took turns on the swinging-glider, and then back inside to see the exercise area and the chapel. In the gathering room, they watched a short video which beautifully described the background and life of Little Sisters of the Poor. After a Q&A session, we headed into the Chapel for Mass with Bishop Pates as our celebrant. That was special as he really enjoyed their participation. The Sisters and several residents attended, including three retired priests. We met up with Leveda Faulkner, a resident Serran who is a member of the St. Paul Club. It was such a wonderful surprise! Leveda and I recalled meeting each other at Our Lady of Guadalupe in St. Paul last year during their gifting and installation of a painting of St. Junipero Serra.

Stella Roman enjoyed her first experience with the vocations bus trip sharing, "What a great experience I had accompanying the 8th grade girls from Sacred Heart Catholic School on their Vocations visit with The Little Sisters of the Poor. Their Youth Minister (Katie, who provided a wonderful presence at 39 weeks pregnant!) accompanied the girls who were polite, attentive, and had great fun bowling with the residents. The residents were all smiles as they rolled the adapted bowling balls towards the pins to cheers from everyone."

Stella and I agreed that we are grateful for the opportunity to participate and look forward to another rewarding bus trip soon.

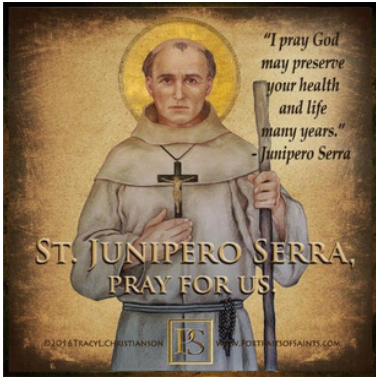

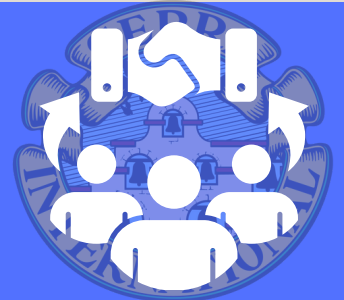
